## **Biography**

**Dr. Chris Dickey** (they/them) has led a varied career as a performer, teacher, adjudicator, composer, and speaker. They have performed throughout the United States, South America, and Asia. Dr. Dickey is currently Associate Professor of Tuba and Euphonium at Washington State University. In addition to teaching tuba and euphonium, they teach LGBTQ+ music courses, coach chamber music, conduct the tuba choir, and perform in faculty ensembles. During the summer they are on the faculty of the Red Lodge Music Festival in Red Lodge, MT.

Each year Dr. Dickey travels to perform recitals and teach master classes at universities and high schools around the country. They enjoy developing the next generation of educators, performers, composers, and entrepreneurs. Their numerous solo and chamber music recordings have garnered critical acclaim from the brass community. Composers in the United States and abroad have written works for Chris, including Elaine Fine, Zachery Meier, Ricardo Arbiza, Fernando Deddos, Juantio Becenti, brin solomon, Katahj Copley, and Nicole Chamberlain, to name a few.

Dr. Dickey received a Doctor of Music degree from Northwestern University where they were the recipient of the prestigious Eckstein Scholarship. They earned a Master of Arts degree from the University of Iowa and a Bachelor of Music degree, summa cum laude, from Eastern Illinois University. Dr. Dickey is a Miraphone Performing Artist.
